Amelia Earhart had this to say about the power of kindness:



Nationally, we need a citizenry committed to making the ideals of liberty the practices of life in America. Christianity needs followers of Jesus committed to making the ideals of God's kingdom the practices of daily life.

This is not an either-or situation. Christians everywhere are citizens of two countries, one on earth and one in eternity. The kingdom of God is not yet fully come, but it's already in effect. Our two citizenships can neither be fully united nor fully separated. We cannot withdraw from the world and pretend we are somehow dwelling only in the kingdom of God now; nor can we simply embrace the world and assume earthly governments fulfill God's will. Those are extremes, and they are unbiblical.

Why I stopped attending sports events.... Hmmm, sound familiar?


- 1. Every time I go, they ask for money.

- 12. I want my kids to choose for themselves what sport they like best.



BITS AND PIECES – July/August 2022



Thomas Coke (9 Sept 1747 – 2 May 1814) was born in Brecon Wales. He was not a tall man, only 5-foot one inch tall and was prone to being overweight. He was a learned man. He went to the Jesus College, Oxford and received his Doctor of Civil Law in 1775.

He was ordained in the Church of England in 1775. He served a curacy in Somerset and had already allied with the Methodist movement. He got into trouble with the new rector who found out about his holding cottage services of the sort promoted by John Wesley. He was dismissed in 1777.

He had met John Wesley in 1776 and became a close assistant. Wesley called him "the flea" because he always seemed to be hopping around on his missions.

In 1784, Wesley consecrated Coke as Superintendent, a title that was replaced in 1787 in America by that of Bishop. On Christmas Day in 1784 in Baltimore, Coke and Francis elected Asbury were superintendents and the Church was constituted as an independent body under the name of the Methodist Episcopal Church been j27 December, Coke ordained presbyters deacons and and Asbury consecrated Superintendent. So, both Coke and Asbury are regarded as jointly the first superintendents (or Bishops) of the Methodist Church

in America.

Coke returned to England in June 1785 and made eight further visits to America. While in America, he spoke out against slavery and actually wrote a letter to George Washington about it. He met with him twice and Washington even invited him to preach before Congress.

Coke made his first mission to the West Indies in 1786 and further visits in 1788, 1790 and 1792.

Following John Wesley's death in 1791, he became Secretary to the British Conference. He was President of the Conference in 1797 and 1805.

He was married twice, once in 1805 at the age of 58 and then in 1811. He outlived both wives.

He had hoped to open Methodist missions in the East Indies and on 30 Dec 1813 set sail for Ceylon. However, four months at sea, he died possibly of a stroke. He was buried at sea in the Indian Ocean.

Asbury described him as "a gentleman, a scholar, a bishop to us; and as a minister of Christ in zeal, in labours, in services, the greatest man in the last century".
